
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Order: New Paintings by Deborah Pelias

New Orleans may be many things, but minimal it ain't. Given our local preference for organic clutter over stark simplicity, the Heriard-Cimino Gallery's longtime emphasis on minimalism may have been a bit of a gamble. If so, it seems to have paid off in the work of artists such as Deborah Pelias, whose abstract, nearmonochromatic canvases come across as the opposite of the baroque flourishes that one might expect from a city that identifies itself so totally with the fleur de lis. But look again and there's a lot going on under those translucent surfaces with their mysterious covering and uncovering of repeated shapes in primarily muted tones. Seemingly stark when seen from a distance, their silky surfaces soon reveal a subtle patterning that somehow spans the gap between man and nature, East and West, the simple and the complex. -D.
